		 Children over the age of 11 use face coverings at all times. Parents/carers who need to drop off and pick up pupils are asked to do so via the streets surrounding the school. 		There are one or two students with complex personal needs who sometimes need support to manage those needs. The school works closely with the children, parents and staff to put in place measures to keep everyone safe.			
		Supplies for soap, hand sanitiser and tissues are topped up regularly and monitored to make sure they're not close to running out.			

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		Bins are emptied throughout the day.

Spreading infection due to excessive contact and mixing between pupils and staff around and outside of the school		As of 2 nd November 2020, all students and staff are required to wear face coverings or visors in all areas, including classrooms, until further notice. Exemptions exist for students and staff with autism, asthma or other acknowledged anxiety. Students are asked to use more than one face covering per day in order to minimise risk of infection through dirty ones. Face coverings need not be used: when outside, when taking part in PE lessons where respiration levels increase or in the dining hall or wet break areas whilst students are eating. Details of how to buy, care for and dispose of face coverings			
		have been shared with parents and carers, displayed on the school website and discussed with students via form time and			

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		via the Student Bulletin. Single use face coverings are always available from Reception and the Pastoral Office.			
		Regular reminders are shared with parents and carers, staff and students.			
		Pupils are kept in the same classes (KS3) or year groups each day and are kept separate from other groups as much as possible. There may be occasions where this is not possible , and these occasions must be discussed with a member of Leadership Group before taking place.			
		For pupils who routinely attend other settings on a part-time basis, such as an alternative provision setting, the school ensures that suitable Risk Assessments are in place before sending students out.	Deputy Headteacher (PDW) to liaise as appropriate		
		Pupil groups have staggered times for break and Form Time to avoid too many pupils being in one place at the same time. Students with packed lunches are encouraged to eat outside when the weather permits, or to use their form room when it does not. Students are regularly reminded of the responsibility to keep their classrooms clean, tidy and litter free.			
		Movement around the school site is kept to a minimum. Pupils are supervised as much as we possibly can to ensure mixing between groups doesn't occur, and they are reminded			
		about the rules throughout the day. However, we regularly remind students of the need to be responsible and to abide by the clear rules set out. We cannot guarantee that we will always be there to monitor their every move.			
		All 'shared' rooms, such as sport halls and dining areas, are kept at reduced capacity to allow groups to keep apart when			

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		using them with timings staggered and spaces segregated, to keep year group bubbles separate.			
		Toilet use is managed to avoid crowding. Staff are on duty at break and lunchtime to keep a check on the number of students in or around toilets. Students are always encouraged to use the toilets within their year group 'bubble'. They are told to queue outside toilets and are allowed to go, if necessary, during lesson time. They must always use the hand sanitizer in each classroom when they return from the toilet.			
		Staff use of staff rooms and offices is staggered to limit occupancy. Staff are encouraged to seek out 'free' spaces during the days when they are on break to avoid congregating together.			
		Staff are advised, wherever possible to take their breaks in their own space or outside with others or socially distanced in room within the school.			
		Staff are advised to bring in flasks of hot drinks and to avoid using the usual communal facilities.			
		Staff wash their hands before entering and after leaving the staff room and/or use the hand sanitiser provided.	Business Manager to liaise as appropriate		
		Visitors to the site, such as contractors, have guidance on physical distancing and hygiene explained to them on or before arrival. Visits happen outside of school hours wherever possible. A record is kept of all visitors.

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		considers the coronavirus measures in place at the destination. Students are able to access the Dining Hall for breakfast but must abide by the social distancing rules in place for all. If it is necessary for them to do so, students continue to use the DAC after school to complete homework, but they must abide by social distancing measures at all times.			
Spreading infection due to the school environment		 Checks to the arcmuss are done regularly to make sure the school is up to required health and safety standards. Fire, first aid and emergency procedures are reviewed to make sure they can still be followed, and changes made to how the school space is being used. Areas in use are well ventilated by opening windows or using ventilation units. Doors are propped open, where fire safety and safeguarding wouldn't be compromised. In colder weather, this means that students and staff have to wear 			
		 coats or additional layers to keep warm. The use of lifts is avoided unless essential and should only contain one person when in use (or student and staff member if student must be accompanied). Bins are provided in classrooms and other key locations to dispose of tissues and any other waste. Outdoor space is used for exercise and breaks, and for education where possible.
