Dear Parents/Carers

Welcome to the Spring edition of the Balfour Newsletter! First and foremost, a very well done to Mrs Beck, who has been appointed to the post of Headteacher of Sir Graham Balfour School with effect from 1st September 2016. I am extremely pleased Governors have made what I firmly believe to be an excellent decision and one which will benefit our school community for many years to come.

This last term as ever, has been an extremely busy one. Preparation for the external exams in summer has been an inevitable focus for many staff and students. However, academic study has been complemented by our increasingly extensive enrichment programme. This has involved Futures Days activities, Modern Language and English plays, and our school Panto amongst many others! However, two events stand out. Firstly, our biennial Sixth Form visit to Sir Graham Balfour Cambodia and secondly our annual 'Spinathon'. Both of these events do much to enrich the life of the school and provide excellent opportunities for personal growth for all those involved.

The Cambodia visit was the result of a two year commitment by all participants. Students had to apply via a rigorous application process and then were required to organise and take part in a whole series of ongoing fundraising activities, for example; giving talks about our Cambodia initiative to local organisations. All finance for the trip had to be and was, self-generated. The visit was conducted successfully during February half-term. Staff and students were both elated and overwhelmed on their return.

The whole school has benefitted from their experiences. Assemblies have been given by the team and a DVD about the trip has been created. 'Thank you' talks have been given to local groups who lent their support to the venture. Most of all, however, the students from SGB Cambodia benefited from contact with the team and from the resources they took with them. We now have clear understanding of the needs of the school which will give a clear focus to future Cambodia related fundraising. An excellent result all round!

The Spinathon was a huge organisational venture involving students, staff, parents, Governors, primary students and friends of the school. It really brought the whole school community together in a way no other event does and created a real 'buzz' around the school. Over £5,700 was raised in 1 day which will be divided between Katherine House Hospice and Sport Relief. I would like to thank formally everyone involved in either organising or taking part in such an outstanding success. I would also like to thank wholeheartedly all who contributed sponsorship money for two very worthwhile causes.

Cambodia 2016 Visit

In the early hours of the 12th February 2014, 12 students and 3 members of staff began

their 10 day adventure to Cambodia.

After a 3 hour drive to Heathrow, a 12 hour flight to Hong Kong and a further $2\frac{1}{2}$ hour flight, we arrived safely in Cambodia's capital, Phnom Penh at around 10:30am in the morning Cambodia time (which is 7 hours ahead).

There was no time to sleep, we went to our guest house and got straight out into the bustling city of Phnom Penh to visit 521. This was once a high school in the capital city; however during Pol Pot's

reign with the Khmer Rouge, the school had been turned into a place of torture and a prison. An estimated 20,000 people were killed here during a very short space of time. This was a very sobering start to our trip and made us all begin to understand the horrifying history of this beautiful country.

To get over our travelling and to adjust to the incredible culture change, we spent the next two days in Sihanoukville, Cambodia's beach resort. With the sun beating down and the warm waves crashing on the shore we found time to try the exotic fruits and meet the locals. In between the odd spot of sunbathing, our time was mostly spent making friends with the local



children and getting our first taste of traditional Cambodian food.

As our time in **Sihanoukville** came to an end, we drove the 5 hour journey to Chi Phat - home of Sir Graham Balfour Cambodia. On arrival at the school, the entrance was lined with over 200 friendly and welcoming smiles clapping and cheering our arrival.





Our time in the school and Chi Phat village was by far the most amazing experience that many of us will cherish for the rest of our lives. We took many resources over to the students to enhance their teaching and learning, from glitter glue to play dough and we taught a range of lessons including English, Maths and Geography. Some students used play dough to make farm animals, then teach them the English word, some taught them body parts, and some students

taught the Cambodian children the names of the colours which they then applied to a Maths puzzle.

To begin with, the 6th Form students found the experience challenging (overcoming the language barrier) but ended up leaving in awe of every young person, due to their resilience and determination to learn English and their gratitude for SGB Stafford's continued support and interest in improving their lives.



Whilst all of this was happening throughout the day, the afternoons and evenings were fun filled too! We were taught some traditional Cambodian playground games, and we taught them some of our games too! We also visited the local waterfall which gave us chance to cool down after a long day of teaching and we visited the high school and played volleyball with the students. With all this in mind, the trip wouldn't have been the same without the experience of staying in a remote village with limited access to electricity and Wi-Fi and lots of interesting creepy crawlies and creatures of the jungle!

From here we had another 7 hour journey back to Phnom Penh where we visited the Killing Fields. This was again a very hard place to visit as it once more reminded us of the shocking history of the country. Having taught in the school at this point it also made us appreciate the importance of the help that we as a school community all give to our school in Cambodia.

We then had another 6 hour drive to Siem Reap; due to the speed at which the country is developing, and the improvements made to the roads, this journey was 2 hours shorter than it was 2 years ago. During our time in Siem Reap we visited the incredible world heritage site of Angkor Wat, which is a series of beautiful and ancient temples across the city. A lovely end to an amazing trip!

This was once again a very successful trip which was made possible by just less than 2 years of hard work and fundraising from the 12 students and 3 members of staff involved. It is an incredible experience and one which everyone involved in the trip will never forget!

Rocket Seeds from Space!

"Astronaut Tim Peake calls for help with 'rocket seeds' experiment"

Tim Peake has asked thousands of schools to grow seeds that have journeyed through space.

In April, up to 10,000 schools will grow and compare the seeds flown to space with those that have



stayed on Earth as part of the nationwide experiment.

Sir Graham Balfour will be one of those schools!

The results will be analysed by biostatisticians and published later this year.



It is hoped the experiment will help reveal the effect of microgravity on seed growth and whether exposure to radiation has caused mutations.

The seeds are back on earth!

At 04:26am on Tuesday 2nd March, Commander Scott Kelly of NASA and Russian cosmonauts Mikhail Kornienko and Sergey Volkov of Roscosmos landed safely back on Earth in Kazakhstan. The seeds then travelled with Scott Kelly to NASA in Houston on a charter flight from Moscow, Russia and returned to the UK on Thursday. They are now getting ready to be packed up so they can be sent to schools with a Rocket Science experiment pack in April!

Sir Graham Balfour will be expecting a delivery of their Rocket Seeds on Tue 12th or Wed 13th April ready to sow on 19th or 20th April.

Jack and the Beanstalk Panto

This is the second year SGB has hosted a panto and this year's production of Jack and The Beanstalk was a credit to all involved. Thoroughly enjoyed by visitors to the two evening productions, the show was also performed to over 360 of our Primary School children over a two day period.

We have since heard from the charity, and pups Fifi, Eddie and Fargo are benefitting from our fundraising and are taking their first steps to become fully trained guide dogs.

Life beyond Levels

You will be well aware that National Curriculum levels have been phased out. I wrote in Balfour News last time about our plans for our 'Curriculum 2016' and what it will look like.

Our teachers are working very hard to have everything in place for September and we are confident that this will be the case.

There will be some minor changes to our Attitude to Learning Reports, particularly for Years 7 and 8. Instead of reporting students' predicted grades, we will be showing simply 'traffic lights' which will indicate whether they are currently predicted to achieve above, on or below their target. We are keen that students so young do not become 'hung up' on a grade which is likely to change several times in the five years up until their GCSEs - rather, we want to show the extent of their progress. I will be holding Parent Q&A sessions on the new Curriculum and Reporting systems in September, so please watch this space for further details. If you have any concerns or questions at this point, however, please do not hesitate to contact me at school.

Homework and organisation

Please do help us and your children by checking that they have packed their bags properly and that they have completed their homework to the best of their ability each time. This will help them make further progress overall and stop them picking up BCs for missing equipment and homework.

I would like to offer my heartfelt thanks to all the students, parents, carers and other members of our community who recently sent me cards, messages, emails and gifts upon my appointment as Headteacher of Sir Graham Balfour from September. It was quite rightly a gruelling interview process and I am both proud and honoured to have been chosen to lead our wonderful school in the next stage of its development. Many, many thanks.
