

Dear Parents, Carers, Students, Grandparents and all other members of our Community

Here we are, at the end of the second full term in school, with the promise of spring just around the corner. Our term has been very busy (as usual) with a really good mix of hard work in classrooms, alongside a wide variety of activities and visits, which, as you read on, are detailed in this newsletter. Dodgathon was an incredible day, with all students and many staff taking part in a day-long dodgeball competition which raised at least £4,000 to be shared with Sport Relief, Katharine House and Sir Graham Balfour Cambodia. Our Year 11 and 13 students are now fully immersed in preparations for their final exams and we are very grateful for the help and support their families are giving them.

As ever, as we now approach the break, there are a few things I would like to share with you:

New Year 7 intake

We received in the end 237 first choice applications for September, a figure which is well above the 170 places we have available. This is very pleasing, in that it shows the trust placed in us by parents and carers, but it is also very disappointing for those families whose exercise of choice turned out differently to their hopes. We look forward to welcoming the Year 7 students into the Balfour Family in September.

Sixth Form unconditional offers

Something we are beginning to become very concerned about is the number of universities now offering Unconditional Offers to students studying A levels. On the face of it, it appears good – a student with an unconditional offer is guaranteed a place at university. In actual fact, however, what tends to happen is that some students start to think that their A levels no longer matter and that they can slacken their efforts. We urge parents to help us with this in encouraging students to achieve their very best grades. Evidence shows that higher A level grades lead to higher earnings and better positions in the future. We will be offering more help and guidance on this for sixth form students and their parents in the summer term.

Funding

Funding remains a very lively concern for us. We run a very tight ship and have done for many years. We have, with very careful management of funding, been able to maintain our staffing levels and the full range of subjects we have always prided ourselves on. Fairer Funding will mean a little extra money coming into school, but it does not cover the increased contributions we will have to make to pensions, NI etc. I therefore urge you to contact your local MP, (for Stafford this is Jeremy Lefroy) and ask them to stand up for your children's rights to a more equal share of funding. In many parts of the country, schools still receive anything up to an additional £3,000 per child per year — in a school of 900 students, you can see the difference this would make.

Entry signing in system

As I have mentioned several times now, we have been taking steps to tighten security to our building. Over Easter our new sign-in system will be installed; all visitors to the school will be asked to sign in before being allowed into the building. I know that I can count on your support with this, helping to ensure, as it does, all our children's and staff safety.

GDPR (General Data Protection Regulations)

New regulations on the use and storage of data come into operation from 25th May this year. We have been working hard on this behind the scenes for many months and are confident that we will be compliant by this deadline. We are currently updating our Privacy Notice, which will replace the one currently on our website – this shows you why and how we keep data on your children. If you have any questions or concerns about this, please do not hesitate to get in touch with us at school.

Uniform

As ever, I want to thank you for your support of our school uniform. I receive many expressions of support and admiration of it on at least a weekly basis. If you are out buying new items over Easter, please do look carefully at the uniform requirements on our website – some items sold under the label of 'Schoolwear' in shops do not conform to our uniform policy. It's better to be safe than sorry! Many thanks for your consideration of this.

May I first thank you for your tireless support of your children and our school and second, wish you all a restful and productive Easter break.

Cambodia Trip

Thursday 15th February saw the departure of our 2018 Cambodia Team on route for their 12 day trip to visit our school in Chi Phat Commune, Thmar Bang, Cambodia. In total, there were 12 6th Form students and 3 staff who were fortunate to have the opportunity to experience the sights of this wonderful country. The visit takes place every two years with students self-funding the cost of the trip through various fundraising activities. After Easter the group will be sharing their experiences with all students via a series of Cambodia themed assemblies. This is a wonderful opportunity for all students in the school to witness how our annual Cambodia school fundraising, supports the education of our students in Cambodia.

Thank you to George M for penning the following article detailing the visit:

February 15th 2018 - We arrived at school for 12:30 to head to Manchester airport for our flight at 22:00 that night! We were all very excited to travel to Phnom Penh! We would first fly to Dubai, and then onwards to Phnom Penh!



February 16th 2018 - After almost 24 hours of travel time, we finally arrived in Phnom Penh, where we met our guide Tee. We were driven to our beds for the night, at Fancy Guest House. On our drive from the airport to the hotel, we saw the beaming lights of Cambodia's capital city! We were all incredibly tired, and went to bed soon after we arrived!

February 17th 2018 - Once we had woken up, we headed straight to the coastal town of Sihanoukville! We ate breakfast in a bakery just outside of Phnom Penh, where we tried lots of different items of Cambodian food. Sihanoukville was where we would spend the next 2 nights! As soon as we arrived we headed straight to the beach, and swam in the sea!

February 18th **2018** - We began another day in Sihanoukville! We had breakfast at the Otres Beach Bungalows where we were staying! We were all excited to get back to the beach and then back into the sea! The sun was very dangerous that day, and I got very burnt! After this, we ate together, and prepared to travel to Chi Phat village the next day!

February 19th 2018 - We began our trip to Chi Phat! This was the day that we had all been waiting for, and it was the day we would meet, and teach, the wonderful children at the Sir Graham Balfour School in Cambodia! I will never forget the moment, when we walked up the path to their school, when all the children were lined up, cheering our arrival! It was truly inspiring! We taught the children, some new skills, and played fun games with them!

February 20th 2018 - Our second day in Chi Phat began, when we returned to the school to continue teaching, we met more of the inspiring children, and taught them a multitude of skills ranging from Maths, to English! No matter what subject they were learning, they loved every second of the lesson! We also played fun games with the children, and also taught them the 'cha cha slide' dance!

February 21st **2018** - Today was our final full day in the Chi Phat village, and it began with our breakfast with the locals, in their visitor center! We then returned to the school to say our goodbyes! After we left the school, we went to a waterfall just outside of Chi Phat, where we swam for around an hour – This involved a long walk through the jungle!

February 22nd 2018 - At the beginning of today, we went to the Chi Phat High School, where we played Volleyball and Football with the students there! We then boarded a small boat, which took us to a small commune, where we met with our drivers, who would take us to Phnom Penh. When we got to Phnom Penh, we went directly to the emotional 'Killing Fields' where thousands of innocent Cambodians were killed by the Khmer Rouge... This gave us an emotional insight into the history of Cambodia.

February 23rd 2018 - We started the day by eating breakfast in the great city of Phnom Penh! We then visited the S21 camp, which was a former site of torture during the Khmer Rouge regime! The building formally housed a high school, which highlighted the awful intentions of the Khmer Rouge, while also showing the inspiring stories of those who survived those atrocities. We then went to the Royal Palace, where we saw the beautiful architecture that has survived for over 100 years! The day ended with a visit to the famous night markets, where a number of 'knock off' items can be purchased!

February 24th 2018 - Today began, with breakfast in Phnom Penh again, and then a long drive to Siem Riep! We were going to go straight to the Angkor Watt visitor center, where we would collect our tickets! After this, we went to the 'Babel' Guest House, and then went into the city centre via Tuk Tuk! Siem Riep also had a number of night market stalls, where amazing street food could be brought!

February 25th **2018** - Today we woke up early, and went to Angkor Watt, where we saw Cambodia's trademark attraction! The area is split into a number of different sights to see! The area shows Cambodia's ancient history in a glorious fashion. After this, we went back into the city centre and enjoyed one last night in Siem Riep!

February 26th 2018 - This was our last day in Cambodia, and we spent the first half in Siem Riep, packing our bags, before our flights home later that night! At 13:30, we set of for Phnom Penh Airport. Once we arrived, it was time to say goodbye to Cambodia, and prepare to return to cold England!

February 27th **2018** - We had spent this day traveling from Phnom Penh, to Dubai, to Manchester! After almost 24 hours of travel since leaving Siem Riep, we finally arrived back to Stafford with the snow falling! It was a sharp contrast from the 39 degrees of Cambodia! We were all very sad to be back, but equally as tired, after the adventure of a lifetime!

The day consisted of a tour of the college, what you can study at Oxford, what

it is like to study at Oxford, top tips for applying, and interactive sessions run by current students in the fields of Biology, Chemistry and Egyptology, one of which involved putting a real human skeleton back together.

The day was truly inspiring for the students, with many coming back from the visit saying that they want to study at Oxford, Cambridge or another Russell Group university once they complete



their A-levels at Sir Graham Balfour. To spend the day in such a stunning location steeped in history, being able to speak to current students and experience tasks that first year students undertake was fantastic. The realisation that attending a highly competitive University is possible, if you work hard, secure the grades, show a

real love of your subject and develop yourself through enrichment opportunities both in and out of school, really inspired them.

This is just one of the many events that we are running in conjunction with Oxford, Cambridge and other competitive universities, as we are determined to raise aspirations for all of our students and for them to reach for the stars. Day 1:

Upon arriving in Geneva we made our way to our hostel to quickly drop off our luggage. We then sampled some of the finest delicacies the city had to offer, dining at Lidl's bakery where they had a much more affordable range of pastries on sale. Following this taste of culture, we walked around the lake



enjoying the surprisingly warm sun, while we skimmed stones and took in the contrasting scenery of city and mountains.

Our next destination was the Museum of the History of Science which was perfectly situated on the lakeside. It was home to many interesting pieces of equipment including one of the first telescopes, a thermographic camera and many other fascinating exhibits.

Following thi,s we headed towards the Jet d'Eau (a large fountain in Lake Geneva). On the way we stopped for some ice cream despite the cooling conditions and carrying on past the water jet, we ventured to Saint Peter's Cathedral. Inside we were able to climb the impressive towers to gain a

better view of Geneva. Our descent down the tower was accompanied by Will's enthusiastic rendition of 'We Built This City'; this was certainly a memorable experience.

That evening we had our dinner at the hostel: a classic Swiss dish of a burger, chips and a mushroom sauce. Reuniting, later on, in the common room to play cards and unwind.

Day 2:

The next day we began with another early

start of 7:00am, as we had to be up early to catch the tram to CERN. Arriving at CERN we listened to a presentation about the history of the organisation, before being given a tour of the labs, including where the World Wide Web was created. Then we watched a light show that demonstrated the workings of the Synchro Cyclotron – the very first accelerator operated at CERN.





After that, we walked to the Atlas building and watched a 3D virtual tour, detailing the assembly and function of the particle detector. Following that we went to the Globe of Science and Innovation – a visitor centre designed to teach people about the research taken place at CERN.

Before leaving we couldn't resist a unique photo opportunity. So much to everyone else's confusion, we attempted to pose as letters to spell out CERN. Isaac and James creating the 'C'; Harry, Chris and Joe on the 'E'; Will, Haydn and Josh making the rather challenging 'R'; and Ruby, Sarah and Lucy as the 'N'.

Late afternoon we headed to the Old Town to experience the city and appreciate the sights, before returning to play football in a park beside the lake. We returned to the hostel for dinner and then met in the common room again to play a variety of games, with varying levels of success.

Day 3:

On the final day we visited a market place; and like a scene out of The Apprentice, we attempted to haggle for a product, successfully shaving off one whole franc. In a nearby park we found several giant chess boards so we all challenged each other to a game before heading off to lunch. Some matches, of course, took longer than others but in the end Josh was deemed the ultimate competitor — retaining his chess champion status from when he was nine.



It was then time to say our final goodbye to the hostel and to head to the airport. At this point we all had some loose change left over, we agreed to collect it together and - in true Swiss style - spend it on some Toblerones to enjoy when we returned home. The bus back to school was much less quiet than the first morning, as we ended the trip with a group karaoke, much to the teachers' enjoyment.

Community Activities

Stafford and Rural Homes Start on Site Event

On Thursday 15th February representatives from Sir Graham Balfour School were invited to attend the launch of a new building project in the local community. Supported by £1.135m of funding from Homes England (formerly known as the Homes & Communities Agency), Stafford and Rural Homes (SARH) and construction partner Jessup are working together to transform the Woodlands Road area with the construction of 40 new affordable homes for rent and shared ownership.



As a school, we have been invited to attend a number of similar projects in the area over the years, giving our students an insight into the construction, planning and technology involved in creating new homes in our community. On this occasion our students had also been invited for another reason.

In 2010 students from Sir Graham Balfour had been involved in a project to rejuvenate some garages on the site by creating a mural. In order to clear the site the garages have now been demolished and as a momento of the original project, Stafford and Rural Homes commissioned a photographer to recapture the images painted by our students back in 2010.

The result was a collage of prints displayed in a large frame for display at the school, which was presented to our students by Mrs Karen Armitage, Chief Executive at Stafford and Rural Homes. The students were then given a tour of one of the sites with a promise to return to see the progression over the next few months. Thank you to Evie S, Bob C, Ellie E and Mackenzie S for acting as exemplary Ambassadors for the school.

Sacre



child in Stafford should have the chance to do work experience' and 'Mental health provisions and care should be put as a priority for the young people of Stafford'.


Every single team was amazing, they all remembered their speeches, answered questions well and were confident. After the debates finished the judges made their decision and The Rural Enterprise won.

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
