Dear Parents and Carers

School funding

It is unprecedented that I write to you regarding school funding, but sadly, it has become such an overriding concern that I feel I must. You may well be aware from press and news reports that this issue is currently regularly debated. Indeed the Government is committed to addressing the longstanding historical inequalities which see a school like ours receiving approximately £1 million less per year than a similar school in other parts of the country. According to the estimates put forward, in the new Fairer Funding proposal, we will receive a slight increase in funding, but it will in no way match the increased costs we face, which include NI and pensions contributions, over which we have no choice. Our Trustees and Governors are, like me, determined to do all we can to maintain our very high standards, our broad curriculum and extra-curricular offer, but there is considerable pressure on our school budget now, and in the coming months and years. Many other schools around the country are making very difficult decisions to reduce and restrict GCSE and A Level courses, increase class sizes and reduce the amount of support available to children whose progress depends upon it. Due to the very careful stewardship of our budget over the years, we have a small reserve which will help us avoid going down this route for the next academic year, but after that, we will be in the same position as many other poorly funded schools.

It is on this basis that I ask you to support our school and your child or children, by writing to Jeremy Lefroy, Stafford's MP, and urging him to maintain pressure on the Government to deliver a school settlement that really will be fair, ensuring the same level of funding per child, no matter where they live in the country.

I will be extremely grateful for your support in this matter. If you require any more information on this, and the possible impacts of the current unfair funding, please do not hesitate to get in touch with me.

Parents driving on to site at school start and end

A plea! Please avoid driving on to the school site before or after school. School buses find it very difficult to navigate the narrow drive with so much traffic, which puts our children at risk. If you have to drive your child to school, please arrange an alternative, near-by area to drop them off, therein safeguarding everyone. Many thanks for your help with this.

Canteen, Lunchtime passes and safeguarding

I am concerned at the number of our students leaving the site at lunchtime. I understand that many of them wish to buy alternative offerings from the local chip shop etc, but my chief concern lies in the fact that I cannot guarantee their safeguarding when off site, especially if they are not going home. To this end, we are undertaking a review of our on-site catering offer, in order to try to persuade more students to stay on site. A sizeable number of students have filled in a questionnaire and have recently taken part in samples testing. We are also looking at moving to a cashless system (happily at the expense of the catering suppliers) in order to simplify payments and allow more students through the tills more quickly. As part of this, we would also have a preorder system, ensuring that students can have the food of their choice, no matter what time they

go into the canteen over break and lunchtime. As ever, I will keep you informed of our progress in these matters.

Payments

As I am sure most of you are aware we have an on-line payments facility called Tucasi which enables you to pay for school trips and activities using a credit or debit card and provides you with access to your personal account and details of payments, amounts due etc. Whilst we do still accept cash and cheques we are strongly advised by our Auditors that these payments should be kept to a minimum or completely eradicated if possible. Please can I ask you, therefore, to use Tucasi as your preferred payment method. If you do send cash or cheque payments these should be given in to the Finance Office in clearly labelled envelopes and not handed in to other members of school staff. Receipts will be given for the sums handed in.

Parent communication, social media

We are currently reviewing the ways we keep you informed of your child's progress, school news and events. The website is updated regularly but we are also looking into the use of parent-centred Apps and also social media. I will keep you informed of the progress we make and the decisions we take on this.

Uniform

We are very much looking forward to September and the introduction of our smart new uniform. Many thanks for your feedback earlier this year, which showed a considerable majority of you in favour of the proposed changes. On our two face-to-face consultation evenings, we saw in excess of 100 families; it was very pleasing to receive your feedback and praise for ensuring that the new uniform was not only smart, but also affordable, with a wide choice of suppliers.

And finally..

As we approach the onset of the GCSE and A level exams I want to thank you for your neverending support and forbearance (!) with helping your children stay organised and prepared for the everyday challenges of school. For those of you with children in Year 11, you will be the first to see your children achieving grades between 1 and 9 for English and Maths, but A*-G grades in the rest of their subjects. By 2019 all exams will be graded on the new 1-9 system (with 9 being the highest grade possible). The latest news we have is that a 4 will be classed as a 'standard' pass, with 5 being a 'strong' pass. What this will mean in reality to future employers, universities and colleges is still unclear; as soon as there is some clarity, I will let you know.

We wish all our students facing these challenging, undoubtedly stressful public exams all the luck in the world. They have been well taught and well guided in their revision – these last few weeks, including the Easter holiday, are vital in ensuring our young people are fully ready for this testing time – their summer holidays will start very early and therefore, the sacrifice now will be well worth while.

French Trip

1st day - Travelling

On Saturday 25th March a very excited group of 24 students in Years 8 and 9 and 3 staff packed their bags onto the coach, left Sir Graham Balfour and headed south to Normandy in France. We arrived at our hotel late at night and headed straight for bed after a tiring journey and a bumpy ferry ride!

2nd day – Visit to Arromanches, World War II sites and Bayeux.

Our first stop of the trip was the seaside town of Arromanchessur-mer. After seeing the remains of the artificial port, we experienced a powerful and thought-provoking representation of the events of June 6th 1944 at the 360 degree cinema. We then took a walk down to Arromanches where the students enjoyed having some free time to practise their French and sample the local food.



The next visit of the day was to the American war cemetery which everyone found immensely thought-provoking. The students were extremely respectful while visiting the cemetery and got a realisation of the scale of the losses incurred during the war.

We finished the day by visiting the town of Bayeux. The students enjoyed visiting the impressive Cathedral before spending some free time roaming the streets and the local artisan shops.



3rd day – Visit to a Normandy biscuit factory & Cité de la Mer

After breakfast we headed to a family run biscuit factory, which has been making traditional Normandy biscuits for over 200 years. The students were taught in French about how the biscuits are made, and had the chance to make their own.

The main visit of the day was to Cité de la Mer in Cherbourg, where the students enjoyed visiting a large aquarium and got the chance to get up close and personal with sharks and sting rays. We then navigated our way along the narrow corridors of a nuclear submarine before ending the day on a high, with students grabbing the headlines by becoming explorers of the deep blue!

Another highlight of the trip came that evening at dinner, where the students got the chance to taste traditional French snails and frogs legs. Every student got stuck in, with some going back for more!
