<u>Science Department Weekly Work Leader Board – Week 1 Results</u>



Cambodia Visit 2020



Phoebe H (Year 13) - The Cambodia trip is so difficult to describe. The best way I've found so far, is showing people the clip of us going into the school, where the all the kids were lined up on the sides of the path singing as we walked through, and reading them pieces of what I had frantically typed out on my phone when we were on the minibus between places. Here's what I wrote on our first day after we went to S21 and the Killing Fields:

'After we arrived we went to S21 and the Killing Fields, which were both harrowing. S21 was a high school that was turned into one of the most prolific torture houses of the Khmer Rouge era around 18,000 were killed and only 12 left alive. The Killing Fields are the mass grave and slaughter site of thousands of Cambodians, the most upsetting part was 'The Killing Tree' where people were killed by being thrown against it and having their heads crushed before being thrown into the mass pit. Bones are still resurfacing, I saw some. We saw the recovered skulls at both sites as well as pictures of the last 14 victims of S21 (killed as the Vietnamese invaded and the Khmer Rouge leaders fled) in the rooms they were killed, with the same equipment. As weird as it sounds, what made me cry was a note on the bottom of the picture description saying 'note the wallpaper'- there was an odd gap in the pattern, and it was the same in both the room I was standing in and the picture of a man that was brutally killed.

It's so easy to distance yourself from what happened in Cambodia, it almost feels like fiction when you see it written down, but at that moment it became so real to me. This was mass-genocide, and it happened just over 40 years ago; it happened when my mum and dad were alive. Obviously, the situation was very complex, but I think the Khmer Rouge took hold because of ignorance; their middle leaders were mostly low-class children and they wanted to restore Cambodia to a country of farmers and peasants. What we do for the school is so important, education is absolutely key to stopping this from happening again. 'When we know better, we do better'

We started off our trip with such a deep understanding of the impact we have on Sir Graham Balfour Cambodia, that when we got to the school most of us couldn't stop crying. It's amazing to know that even in such a small way, we are a part of what that school is doing, especially having supported it through the fundraising we've done in school since Year 7.

We're all so thankful to the whole school community for supporting us and our fundraising, without you, we wouldn't have had such an incredible experience. We all managed to fundraise £1500 to get to Cambodia, and without support from our family and friends that never would've happened, so from the bottom of all of our hearts, thank you so much.





SGB Careers Fair and Business Enterprise Event

Our annual Careers Fair and Business Enterprise Event took place on PSHE Day – Thursday 23rd January. In total, 46 exhibitors attended and students from Year 7 through to Year 13, had the opportunity to visit the fair to meet the exhibitors and ask questions regarding their career opportunities. Thank you to everyone who supported the school and took time out of their busy schedules to attend.

In addition to the Careers Fair the school also co-ordinated a Business Enterprise Event throughout the day with students attending various workshops, which introduced them to many aspects of working within a business. This year we also hosted a new activity called Challenging Stereotypes, which encouraged students to consider a range of different careers that they may not have thought about previously.



Visit to Oxford University

On Wednesday 15th January 2020, 15 of our year 11 students had the opportunity to attend a visit day to Oxford University based at University College.

The students were given key information about the university, about the application process and also, the steps they should be taking now to improve and enhance their subject knowledge.

Competitions

Debate Club Success - Written by Ben L, Year 10

Our school debate club has recently competed in another debate competition, this time against the debate club of Weston Road Academy.

This comes as part of an interschool competition involving the rest of the schools in Stafford, a project run by Youthnet. Schools will hold debates with each other in front of a panel of judges, who will then assign points to a team based on their performance – this might include eye contact with the audience, hand gestures to emphasise points, a clear voice, content of the speech, etc.

Recently, just before the school was temporarily closed for most students, following the coronavirus outbreak, our debate team went to Weston Road Academy to compete with their debate team. The group of 3 students debating were Lola F as 1st speaker, Ava H as 2nd speaker, and I as summariser.

In the past, our debate club has gone to events that use a formal method of debating: a speaker will introduce the topic, a main speaker will expand on it and give a team's argument in detail, the floor will then be open to questions, and finally the summariser will recap the points made and questions asked.



This year however, Youthnet has introduced a new, different debating style called the 'Noisy Classroom' format. Although the basic structure of the debate is more or less the same, it is far less formal, and the speakers have a far smaller timeframe to present their arguments. This is because the teams do not know what the topic is beforehand and have a mere 20 minutes to create their speeches – quite a tough time constraint to get a fully-fledged, flowing argument.

Although we did manage to win the round, Weston Road's debate team were certainly good debaters in their own right, presenting a compelling, clear argument for their side of the debate. This is even more impressive given the fact that they had the harder point to argue - that the internet is a bad thing. Overall, it was a fun debate, and I, and the rest of the debate team are looking forward to the next one.

After an amazing and completely astonishing win last year, I signed up again for the Law Competition this year. Every Friday we could manage, from October till March, we would meet in Miss McConnachie's room for an hour. In the first few sessions we were given the case and learnt a bit of a background to Law. The complexity of the court system itself is so much more than you can imagine, from the Magistrates Court to the final court of appeal; The Supreme Court.

Our Mock trial took place at Cannock Magistrates Court, I remember visiting it last year for the first time. There are multiple different roles in a magistrate's court, all of them are essential to ensure the trial goes according to plan. There are magistrates that listen to the whole trial and decide the verdict. Defence and prosecution lawyers that must convince the magistrates that the defendant (suspect) is either guilty or not guilty. The prosecution and defence witnesses that give their evidence and account in court, the usher who essentially makes sure the trial runs smoothly.

Finally, the legal advisor, whose job is to state legal reasons, practice and procedure. Court artists and court reporters are also included in a real trial, but we didn't use them in our mock trial.

On Saturday 14th March, after months of practising, hard work and dedication, the day had finally come. It was an early start as we were to make it to Cannock before 10am and everyone was feeling the nerves. In the local heat, there were three schools; Sandbach High School, The Excel Academy and Sir Graham Balfour. The whole day is split into three sections, Round 1, Round 2 and Round 3. There are two schools in each round, one school would act as prosecution and the other school as defence. SGB was in both Round 1 and 2. On our break, we had the opportunity to look around the cells in the court, where people who had been arrested were kept. Prisoners are usually kept in a cell overnight to make sure they make it to their trial. There is a flight of stairs that leads to a glass box called a dock, where these people are kept during their trials. The cells thoroughly interested us because it was fascinating the precautions that courts must put in place. After both the prosecution and defence had gone, we had given it all we got, all that was left were the results. The winning school would go through another heat before progressing in the final, held in London. Had we won?



Unfortunately, Sandbach High School took the win this time, everyone was gutted after partaking in such a stressful and challenging day. Even though, that was my last time entering a Magistrates court (I hope!) it's one of the most amazing experiences. To think that people do this in their everyday life is astonishing, but it gave a proper insight into how demanding and sometimes extremely rewarding a career in Law can be. There were real magistrates in the competition, in which we discovered that being a magistrate is voluntary and they don't get paid for such an important job. I will always be extremely grateful for my time in The Law Competition, and I hope that from reading this, it inspires you to go out and get stuck into something that you've never done before.

The Great Balfour 'Cook Off' and Rotary Young Chef Competition

On Wednesday 18th December we hosted The Great Balfour 'Cook Off' Competition. Six students took to the kitchen to produce a two course meal within an hour and a half timescale. Judging included how the students used their workspace and equipment, techniques used, menu choice plus ingredients used, and of course the taste of the dishes.

The competition was the internal preliminary stage of the Rotary Young Chef competition in preparation for the District heat, which was due to take place in February at Stafford College. All of the competitors were brilliant and the standard of the meals they produced would not look amiss in a restaurant setting. The judging panel consisted of Mrs Beck – Headteacher, Mrs Hill and Mrs Thompson from Perry's of Eccleshall (Perrys Field to Fork Artisan Butchery and Cookery School). Selecting a winner was not an easy task. Eventually, the overall winner was announced as Sidney from Year 8, who would represent the school and the Rotary Club of Stafford Knot in the next stage of the competition.
